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PREFACE

New Mexico Chapter Laws are numbered in the order in which the Governor signs them. If one or more chapters amended the same section of existing statutes, the version that becomes law is the version in the last bill signed.

The Governor has line-item veto power over bills containing appropriations. Partial vetoes are designated by striking through the deleted language.

The designation “CS/” or “FL/” before a bill means “Committee Substitute” or “Floor Substitute” indicating that a House or Senate Committee, or the entire House or Senate during a floor session, passed a rewritten version in place of the original bill.

The effective date of the signed bill is shown at the end of the chapter summary. Unless a specific effective date is listed in the bill, it is effective 90 calendar days after the close of the session (June 17 this year) or, if it is an appropriation, on July 1, the beginning of the new fiscal year. Bills with an emergency clause (*) become effective on the date signed by the Governor.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments (CA) are in the form of joint resolutions passed by both houses and are numbered in order of final passage. They do not require the Governor’s signature, but are enacted if they receive voter approval by a majority vote at a statewide general or special election.

Joint Resolutions and Memorials are expressions of intent and usually request state agencies or committees to perform some task and report back to the Legislature. They have passed both houses, but do not require the Governor’s signature. Memorials are also expressions of intent or request for some action but need only pass the house in which they were introduced. They do not require the Governor’s signature.

All bills that were vetoed by the Governor this year are reported at the end of the Summary. A “pocket veto” designation means the Governor took no action on the bill within the required time limit. This effectively vetoes the measure.

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2011 SUMMARY OF NEW MEXICO LAWS of Interest to Municipalities

Chapter 7

SB 140

MV: BLOOD DONOR RECOGNITION PLATES (Nava). Authorizes the Taxation and Revenue Department to issue special license plates recognizing blood donors; an additional \$35 fee is added to the regular registration fee, \$25 of which goes to the Department of Health to fund blood donation outreach and education. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 8

SB 110

DOMESTIC ABUSE VICTIM PHOTO COSTS (Garcia). Amends §40-13-3.1; an alleged victim of domestic abuse shall not be required to bear the cost of obtaining law enforcement reports or photographs or copies of photographs relating to the alleged abuse or pattern of abuse. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 16

*SB 134

PROHIBIT SYNTHETIC CANNABINOIDS (Beffort). Amends §30-31-5 to add synthetic cannabinoids to the definition of a Schedule I controlled substance; amends §§30-31-22 and 23 to make possession and distribution of synthetic cannabinoids a crime based on the amount in possession or to be distributed; a minor who violates the possession provision is guilty of a petty misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$100 or 48 hours of community service; for third or subsequent violation, punishment shall be governed by provisions of the Children's Code; a minor is a person under 18 years of age. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. Effective 3/31/11.

Chapter 17

SB 102

REQUIRE PALM PRINTS FOR ARRESTED (Rue). Amends §29-3-8 to require palm prints for those arrested for felonies or for offenses that carry an imprisonment of six months or more. Effective 6/17/11.

NMFA PUBLIC PROJECT FUND PROJECTS (Varela). NMFA WATER PROJECT FUND PROJECTS (Nuñez). Authorizes the New Mexico Finance Authority to make loans or grants from the Water Project Fund for the following municipal water projects: **Albuquerque-Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority**: water storage, conveyance and delivery project [listed twice]; **Bloomfield**: water storage, conveyance and delivery project; **Cimarron**: water conservation, treatment, recycling or reuse project; **Clayton**: water conservation, treatment, recycling or reuse project; **Clovis**: water conservation, treatment, recycling or reuse project; **Deming**: water storage, conveyance and delivery project; **Gallup**: water storage, conveyance and delivery project; **Hobbs**: water conservation, treatment, recycling or reuse project; **Las Cruces**: water storage, conveyance and delivery project; **Las Vegas**: water conservation, treatment, recycling or reuse project; and water storage, conveyance and delivery project; **Lordsburg**: water conservation, treatment, recycling or reuse project; **Los Alamos**: water conservation, treatment, recycling or reuse project: and a flood prevention project; **Los Lunas**: water storage, conveyance and delivery project; **Mesilla**: water storage, conveyance and delivery project; **Questa**: water storage, conveyance and delivery project; **Rio Rancho**: water conservation, treatment, recycling or reuse project; **Ruidoso**: water storage conveyance and delivery project; **San Ysidro**: water storage, conveyance and delivery project; **Santa Fe**: watershed restoration and management project; **Santa Rosa**: water storage, conveyance and delivery project; **Taos**: water conservation, treatment, recycling or reuse project; and water storage, conveyance and delivery project; **Truth or Consequences**: water storage, conveyance and delivery project. Chapter 28

HB 64

CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT LITIGATION LOCATION (Larrañaga). Enacts a new section of Chapter 57 to require that a provision of a construction contract, agreement or understanding that is made part of a construction contract for an improvement to real property is void, unenforceable and against public policy of the state if the provision makes the contract subject to the laws of another state, or requires any litigation arising from the construction contract to be conducted in another state; any mediation, arbitration or other dispute resolution relating to the contract for work performed in New Mexico shall be conducted in this state; “construction contract” means a public, private, foreign or domestic contract relating to construction, repair or maintenance of any real property in New Mexico and includes agreements for architectural services, demolition, design services, development, engineering services, excavation or other improvement to real property, including buildings, shafts, wells and structures, whether on, above or under real property. Applies to contracts entered into on or after July 1, 2011. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 37

*HB 13

DRINKING WATER SYSTEM FINANCING (Crook). Appropriates \$2 million from the Public Project Revolving Fund to the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund to provide state matching funds for federal Safe Drinking Act projects and to carry out the purposes of the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund Act. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. Effective 4/4/11.

Chapter 47
CS/HB 458

MV: ADDRESS BOX IN UNIFORM TRAFFIC CITATION. Amends §66-8-128. Requires a space to be added on the state's uniform traffic citation for the physical and mailing addresses of the individual charged. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 49
SB 77

CHILD ABUSE TRAINING FOR POLICE (Garcia, MJ). New material requires child incident abuse training yearly as part of the curriculum for police certification. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 52
SB 109

OFFICIAL STATE NECKLACE (Munoz). Amends §12-3-4 to make the Native American squash blossom the official state necklace. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 53
SB 267

LAW ENFORCEMENT CONTRACTS WITH COLLEGES (Neville). New material authorizes a post secondary educational institution, a community college or a technical vocational institution that does not have campus police to enter into written agreements with municipalities to enforce campus traffic regulations; authorizes those institutions to promulgate campus traffic regulations that include parking, removing or booting vehicles and vehicle registrations; traffic regulations promulgated by the institutions shall have the same penalty that shall not exceed the same for violations of a state law or local ordinance. The bill authorizes a penalty assessment program to pay fines, or the defendant may request a trial in front of the municipal judge. All penalties and fines assessed shall be paid to the municipality to defray the cost of enforcement and adjudication and the uniform traffic citation shall be used as the complaint form; in the absence of a written agreement with a municipality, any violation of a campus traffic regulation shall carry a maximum penalty of \$5 and the fines are to be paid to the institution. A municipality enforcing campus traffic may, by commission, authorize campus security personnel to issue citations for violations of non-moving traffic regulations, but in no case shall they have arrest powers; when issuing a traffic citation, the campus security officer shall be wearing a distinctive badge and uniform issued to the officer by the post-secondary institution. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 60
CS/HB 523

GRT: LOCOMOTIVE FUEL TAX GROSS RECEIPTS DEDUCTION. Enacts five new sections of the Gross Receipts and Compensating Tax Act. Provides for a deduction for the sale of locomotive fuel from gross receipts and compensating tax; to be eligible for the deduction the fuel shall be used or loaded by a common carrier that, after July 1, 2011, made a capital investment of \$100 million or more in new construction or renovations at the railroad locomotive refueling facility in which the fuel is sold, loaded or used. Requires the Economic Development Department to track temporary and permanent jobs from all railroad activity at each new refueling facility that claims the deduction; the Economic Development and Taxation and Revenue Departments shall estimate the amount of state revenue attributable to the railroad activity; an annual report is due to the Interim Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Committee and Legislative Finance Committee by November of each year. An appropriate legislative committee shall review the effectiveness of the deduction every six years beginning in 2019. The law is effective July 1, 2013, provided that prior to July 1, 2012, a railroad locomotive refueling facility project in Doña Ana County has begun, including land acquisition, acquisition of all necessary permits and commencement of actual construction.

Chapter 61

CS/CS/SB 179 GRT: LOCOMOTIVE FUEL DEDUCTION. New material states that receipts from the sale of fuel to a common carrier to be loaded or used in a locomotive engine may be deducted from gross receipts and compensating tax; the purpose of the deduction on locomotive fuel is to encourage the construction, renovation, maintenance and operation of railroad locomotive refueling and related activities in New Mexico. To be eligible for the deduction, a common carrier must, after July 1, 2011, have made a capital investment of \$100 million or more in new construction or renovations at the railroad refueling facility in which the fuel is loaded or used and the common carrier shall deliver the appropriate nontaxable transaction certificate to the seller; the Economic Development Department shall promulgate rules for the issuance of a certificate of eligibility for purposes of claiming the deduction; the Economic Development Department shall keep a record of temporary and permanent jobs from all railroad activity at each refueling facility that claims the deduction; the Economic Development and Taxation and Revenue Departments shall estimate the amount of state revenue that is attributable to all railroad activity occurring at each refueling facility claiming the deduction. The effective date of this Act is July 1, 2013, provided that prior to July 1, 2012, the Economic Development Department certifies to the Taxation and Revenue Department that construction of a railroad locomotive refueling facility project in Dona Ana County has commenced, including land acquisition, acquisition of all necessary permits and commencement of actual construction; the Taxation and Revenue Department shall notify the New Mexico Compilation Commission and the Director of the Legislative Council Service prior to July 1, 2013 as to whether the certification from the Economic Development Department has been received.

Chapter 64

HB 16

WATER PROJECT FINANCING ELIGIBILITY (Gonzales). Amends §72-4A-1, -3, -5, -7. of the Water Project Finance Act. Expands eligibility for funding. Adds “land grant-merced controlled and governed pursuant to Sections 49-1-1 through 49-1-18 or 49-4-1” and a “regional or local public water utility authority created by statute” to the definition of “political subdivision”. Amends the definition of “qualifying entity” to include an intercommunity water or natural gas supply association or corporation organized under Chapter 3, Article 28, NMSA 1978. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 74

SB 84

GRT: EXTEND SUNSET FOR JET FUEL DEDUCTION (Griego, P.) Amends §7-9-83 and 84 to extend the gross receipts and compensating tax deduction for jet fuel from 2012 to 2017. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 78

SB 286

MV: ACCESS AISLE DEFINITION (Ortiz y Pino). Amends §66-1-4.1 to require the “NO PARKING” designation at the rear of the Access Aisle instead of the actual handicapped parking space. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 80

SB 523

INDUSTRIAL REVENUE BOND TAXING ENTITY NOTICE (Campos). Amends §4-59-4.1. Requires that prior to adopting an ordinance issuing county industrial revenue bonds that a county give notice to any entity located within the county authorized to levy property taxes of its intent to consider the matter; the entities shall be notified by certified mail, return receipt requested at least 30 calendar days prior to the meeting at which final

action is to be taken; the notice shall include the amount, the purpose and the time period of the proposed industrial revenue bonds. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 82

HB 558

INDUSTRIAL REVENUE BONDS TAXING ENTITY NOTICE (King). Amends §4-59-4.1. Prior to adopting an ordinance issuing county industrial revenue bonds, a county is required to give notice to any entity located within the county authorized to levy property taxes of its intent to consider the matter; the entities shall be notified by certified mail, return receipt requested, at least 30 calendar days prior to the meeting at which final action is to be taken; the notice shall include the amount, the purpose and the time period of the proposed industrial revenue bonds. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 83

HB 527

CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD CHECK UPDATES (Herrell). Enacts one new section. The Department of Public Safety shall maintain an electronic subscription service to provide notice of updates to criminal history records, including dispositions, for agencies authorized by law to receive particular criminal history record information; the Department shall update, upon receipt, criminal history repository records and dispositions pursuant to any change in information discovered by the Department; within 48 hours after the Department becomes aware that an individual's criminal history record information in a repository record has changed, the Department shall provide notice of the updated information to any agency authorized by law to receive information on that particular record. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 84

SB 365

DNA SAMPLES FROM PERSONS IN FELONY ARRESTS (Asbill). Amends §29-3-10; a DNA sample from those persons arrested for felonies shall not be analyzed and shall be destroyed unless one of the following conditions are met: 1) the arrest was made upon an arrest warrant for a felony; 2) the defendant has appeared before a judge or magistrate who made a finding that there was probable cause for the arrest; or 3) the defendant posted bond or was released prior to appearing before a judge or magistrate and then failed to appear for a scheduled hearing. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 86

SB 132

UNIFORM CREDIT CARD USE FEE (Campos). Amends §6-10-1.2 to allow state agencies and local governing bodies to charge a uniform convenience fee for credit card use to cover fees charged by financial institutions that are directly related to processing a credit card or electronic transfer transaction. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 92

SB 520

MUNICIPAL CORPORATION BOND DEPOSITS (Beffort). Amends §6-15-5 to eliminate the requirement that all bidders for municipal bonds submit a deposit prior to the acceptance of the bids; only the best bidder is required to submit a deposit. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 94

CS/SB 617

PUBLIC WORKS CONTRACTORS REGISTRATION. Amends §13-4-13.1; no later than 30 days before the expiration of the required contractor registration certificate, the Construction Industries Division shall mail to the registrant's address a reminder of the approaching expiration date; changes the payment of the registration fee from \$200 annually to \$400 every two years. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 102
HB 437

VETERANS' PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION (Garcia, T.). Exempts from property tax the property of a veterans' organization chartered by the U.S. Congress and that is used primarily for the benefit of veterans and their families. Applies to taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2012. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 103
CS/HB 500

EXCAVATION NOTICES & UTILITY PIPELINES. Amends §§62-14-2 thru 5, 5.1, 7.1, & 8. Amends the definitions of "pipeline" and "underground utility line" to exclude master meter systems and operators as defined; clarifies that the "one-call notification system" is also for the purpose of damage reporting; requires a person who prepares engineering plans for excavation or who engages in excavation to immediately notify the one-call notification system operating in the area in the form and format required by the Public Regulation Commission in addition to notifying the owner of the underground facilities of facilities that may have been damaged or dislocated during the excavation work. Requires both the excavator and the owner or operator to use the uniform color code in marking the location of underground facilities. Exempts private underground facilities owned by a homeowner and operated and located on residential property from the requirement to be a member of the one-call notification system. For purposes of the administrative penalties, removes the condition that the offense of willful failure to comply with this Act must have also contributed to the damage of any pipeline or underground utility line. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 104
CS/HB 652

EMERGENCY GAS PILOT RELIGHTING ACT. Requires the Higher Education Department and Regulation and Licensing Department to recommend to appropriate institutions of higher learning a program for training and certifying individuals to relight pilot lights for residential equipment and appliances; the certification is valid for five years. Authorizes certified journeyman plumbers and gas fitters to employ no more than five gas pilot relighting technicians during a period of a Governor-declared emergency or disaster; the duties of the certified technicians are limited to work directly related to the relighting of pilot lights for residential equipment and appliances serving residences with not more than four dwelling units. Authorizes the Secretary of Homeland Security and Emergency Management to adopt rules permitting state funds to be used to pay the cost for these services rendered during the emergency period, as long as it is authorized and funds are made available pursuant to the declaration. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 106
HB 411

STATE AGENCY SUBMISSION OF TIMELY AUDITS (Varela). Amends §§6-6-2 & 7-1-6.15; enacts new material. The Secretary of Finance and Administration shall temporarily withhold a distribution to a municipality or county that has failed to submit an audit report required by the Audit Act or a financial report; the distribution withheld shall remain in the Tax Administration Suspense Fund until distributed to the municipality or county and shall not be distributed to the general fund. Once the State Auditor notifies the Secretary that a state agency, institution, municipality or county has failed to submit an audit report, the Secretary shall require submission of monthly financial reports to the Department until all past-due audit reports are submitted; if after 90 days, all past-due reports have not been submitted or otherwise made progress, the Secretary may direct the Secretary of Taxation and Revenue to temporarily withhold periodic allotments to the municipality or county; the amounts withheld, the source of the amounts and the period of time are subject to the following: 1) transfers to a county or

municipality of receipts from any local option gross receipts tax or from a tax imposed pursuant to the Local Liquor Excise Tax Act shall not be withheld; 2) the source and amount of a withheld distribution shall be determined in a manner that will not impair any outstanding debts or other obligations of the municipality or county, or interrupt a redirected distribution to the NM Finance Authority pursuant to an ordinance or a resolution passed by the county or municipality; 3) the initial amount withheld shall not exceed five percent of the amount that would otherwise be distributed to the municipality or county pursuant to the Tax Administration Act and shall be for a period of no more than three months; every three months, the Secretary shall determine if the municipality or county has submitted all past-due audit reports; if they have not been submitted, the amount being withheld may be increased by an additional amount, up to another five percent; once all past-due audit reports have been submitted, the withheld amounts shall be distributed to the municipality or county in full. If notice is received from the Local Government Division that a municipality or county has failed to submit two consecutive financial reports, the same guidelines as those described for past due audit reports will be followed. Amends §12-6-3. The State Auditor shall notify the Legislative Finance Committee and the Secretary of Finance and Administration if: 1) a state agency, institution, municipality or county has failed to submit a required audit report within 90 days of the due date specified by the State Auditor; 2) the State Auditor has investigated the matter and attempted to negotiate with the state agency, institution, municipality or county but no progress has been made toward compliance with the Audit Act. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 115
CS/HB 440

GRT: ADVANCED ENERGY TAX DEDUCTION FOR SOME LEASES. Amends §7-9-114. Extends the advanced energy deduction from Gross Receipts and Compensating Tax to the leasing of tangible personal property or services that are eligible generation plant costs; the deductions for leases shall be available for a 25-year period. States that the purpose of the advanced energy deduction is to encourage the construction and development of qualified generating facilities in New Mexico and to sequester or control carbon dioxide emissions. Requires the Economic Development Department to keep a record of temporary and permanent jobs at all qualified generating facilities; also requires the Economic Development and Taxation and Revenue Departments to measure the amount of state revenue attributable to activity at each qualified generating facility; in coordination with the Environment Department, a report is due annually to the appropriate legislative interim committee on the effectiveness of the advanced energy deduction. Requires the appropriate legislative committee to review the effectiveness of the advanced energy deduction every four years beginning in 2015. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 117
CS/HB 478

WATER UTILITIES PAYMENTS IN ADVANCE. Amends §§3-23-1 & 3-23-6. Adds the Albuquerque-Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority to the sections authorizing municipalities to require payment in advance or reasonable deposits for municipal utilities and authorizing liens for non-payment of utilities. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 122
SB 119

RETIREMENT BENEFICIARY DESIGNATION OF SPOUSE (Sapien). Amends §§10-11-116 and 22-11-29 to allow a PERA or an ERB retiree to make a one-time, irrevocable designation of a new individual as a beneficiary for benefits. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 125

SB 155

PRIVATE LANDFILL TERM OF PERMITS (Griego, P.) Amends §74-9-24 to increase the period of the life of a permit of privately owned landfills from 10 years to the active life of the facility or 20 years, whichever is less; owners of private facilities permitted prior to July 1, 2010 must submit in writing to the Environmental Improvement Division their decision to opt into the 20-year cycle; privately owned facilities must adjust financial assurance coverage to accommodate requirements pursuant to the Solid Waste Management regulations. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 129

SB 262

CONSTRUCTION INDUSTRIES AND MUNICIPAL INSPECTORS (Sanchez, B.). Amends §60-13-42; municipal building inspectors shall have the ability to inspect in other jurisdictions as long as there is a Memorandum of Understanding. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 131

SB 337

STATE ELECTION CODE: PRECINCT CONSOLIDATION FOR CERTAIN ELECTIONS (Morales). Amends §§1-1-2, 1-3-2, 1-3-4, 1-3-7, 1-3-18. Makes clarifications regarding which authorities may consolidate precincts for their respective elections. The law paves the way to allow for voting centers. When consolidating precincts for primary and general elections: (1) any voter of the county shall be allowed to vote in any consolidated precinct polling place in the county; (2) each consolidated precinct shall have no more than 10 precincts; (3) each consolidated precinct shall comply with §1-3-7 pertaining to polling places; (4) each consolidated precinct polling location shall have broadband internet connection and real-time access to the statewide voter registration electronic management system; (5) the county clerk may maintain any alternative voting locations previously used, in addition to the polling location established in each consolidated precinct; (6) the board of county commissioners may permit rural precincts to be exempted from operating as or being a part of a consolidated precinct, but if the precinct is not designated as a mail ballot election precinct and the polling place does not have real-time access to the statewide voter registration system, the voters registered in the rural precinct are permitted to vote in any consolidated precinct polling location on election day only by use of a provisional paper ballot, which shall be counted after the county clerk confirms that the voter did not also vote in the rural precinct. When precincts are consolidated for a municipal, school or special county election, the proclamation shall state which precincts have been consolidated and the designation of the polling place and the consolidated precincts may allow any voter to vote in any consolidated precinct in the county. Also allows for voters to vote in any consolidated precinct in the county for statewide special elections or special elections to fill a vacancy in the office of U.S. House of Representatives. Requires each consolidated precinct polling location to: (1) have ballots available for voters from every precinct able to vote in the consolidated precinct, (2) have at least one optical scan tabulator programmed to read every ballot style for the consolidated precinct; (3) have at least one voting system available to assist disabled voters; (4) have sufficient spaces for at least five voters to vote simultaneously, with one space wheelchair-accessible; (5) have a secure area for storage of preprinted ballots and a system designed to print ballots at a polling location; (6) issue a ballot to voters who have provided the required voter ID or after the voter has subscribed an application to vote; and (7) be in an accessible location in accordance with the ADA. As a prerequisite to consolidation, the authorizing resolution must find that consolidation will make voting more convenient and accessible to voters of the consolidated precinct and does not result in delays for voters in the voting process and the

consolidated precinct voting location will be centrally located within the consolidate precinct. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 133

SB 367

LOCAL GOVT. PERMANENT FUND, ADDITIONAL INVESTMENTS (Jennings). Amends §6-6-19 to increase the amount from \$10 million to \$40 million of a permanent fund below which a local government shall invest as other funds of the local government; increases the amount from \$10 million to \$40 million that may be invested as funds of class A counties are invested, and if the fund is managed by an investment advisor that is registered with the federal Securities and Exchange Commission and that currently manages assets with a value of at least \$500 million, the fund may also be invested in the following: 1) corporate debt securities, provided the total amount invested in securities issued by the same corporation shall not exceed five percent of the market value of the permanent fund; the securities shall be denominated in U.S. currency; the securities shall be rated AA or higher; the final maturity of the securities may not exceed five years; and the total amount invested shall not exceed thirty percent of the market value of the permanent fund; 2) commercial paper, provided that: the total amount invested in securities issued by the same corporation shall not exceed five percent of the market value of the permanent fund; the securities shall be denominated in U.S. currency; the securities shall be rated in the highest rating category by a nationally recognized statistical rating organization; the final maturity of the securities may not exceed 270 days; and the total amount invested shall not exceed thirty percent of the market value of the permanent fund; and 3) asset-backed securities, mortgage-backed securities; collateralized mortgage obligations or commercial mortgage-backed securities, provided that: the total amount invested shall not exceed five percent of the market value of the permanent fund; the securities shall be denominated in U.S. currency; the securities shall be rated AAA by a nationally recognized statistical rating organization; and the final stated maturity of the securities may not exceed ten years. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 134

SB 369

PUBLIC RECORDS PROVISIONS REORGANIZATION (Ulibarri). Amends §14-2-1; removes from the Inspection of Public Records Act the exception to review records containing the identity or identifying information relating to an applicant or nominee for the position of president of a public institution of higher education and moves that exception to a new section of Chapter 21, State and Private Educational Institutions; removes the exceptions for reviewing documents relating to the discharge of a veteran and moves those to a new section of Chapter 14 that states discharge papers of veterans recorded in the county clerk's office shall be segregated from public records; discharge papers recorded before July 1, 2005 that have been comingled with public records and remain un-segregated are available for inspection in the office of the county clerk but may not be copied; as technology becomes available, county clerks shall segregate comingled discharge papers from public records and shall be available only to: 1) the veteran who filed the papers; 2) the veteran's next of kin; 3) the deceased veteran's properly appointed personal representative or executor; a person holding the veteran's general power of attorney; or 5) a person designated by the veteran in an acknowledged statement to receive the records. Protected personal identifier information contained in public records may be redacted by a public body prior to inspection or copying; the presence of protected personal identifier information on a record does not exempt the record from inspection; un-redacted records that contain protected personal identifier information shall not be made available on publicly accessible web sites operated by or managed on behalf of a public body; defines protected personal identifier information as

all but the last four digits of: 1) a taxpayer identification number; 2) a financial account number; 3) a driver's license number; and 4) all but the year of a person's date of birth; a social security number is considered a protected personal identifier number. The bill also makes several changes to the county clerk's responsibilities in recording documents. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 138
SB 432

GOVERNMENTAL CONDUCT AND CONTRACTS (Eichenberg) Extends portions of the Governmental Conduct Act to local governments; new material states that it is unlawful for a state agency employee or local government agency employee who is participating directly or indirectly in the contracting process to become or to be, while such an employee, the employee of any person or business contracting with the governmental body by whom the employee is employed; a "contract" is an agreement or transaction having a value of \$1,000 or more for services, materials, construction land acquisition, licensing arrangement, loan guarantee or the purchase of financial instruments. No public officer during the term for which elected and no public employee during the period of employment shall acquire a financial interest when the public officer or employee believes or should have reason to believe that the new financial interest will be directly affected by the officer's or employee's official act; prohibits financial service contractors providing services for the investment of public money from contributing anything of value to a public officer or employee of a state agency or local government agency; nothing in the Act prohibits a state agency or local government agency from adopting rules that are more stringent than in the Act. Repeals §§3-10-4, 3-10-5 and 4-44-22 through 27 relating to financial interests of local public officials. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 142
CS/HB 426

INSPECTION OF JAILS. Repeals and enacts a new §33-3-4 relating to the inspection of jails by the governing bodies of counties and municipalities; requires each governing body to conduct an annual site visit to the jail or detention center under its jurisdiction to inspect the overall conditions at the facility; following a site visit, an inspection report shall be presented at a regular meeting of the governing body. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 143
CS/SB 9

MV: LICENSE REQUIREMENTS FOR DRIVERS UNDER 18. Amends §66-5-1.1 to add using a mobile communication device while driving a motor vehicle as a traffic violation for those under 18 years of age with a provisional or instructional license unless the person is licensed by the Federal Communications Commission to operate an amateur radio; "driving" means being in actual physical control of a motor vehicle on a highway or street but does not include being lawfully parked; amends §66-5-5 to allow the Department to issue a driver's license to a person 16 years six-months or older who has had a provisional license for at least 12 months immediately preceding the application and has not been adjudicated for an offense involving alcohol or drug use during the 12-month period immediately preceding the application; a person 15 years-six months or older may apply for a provisional license if: 1) the driver has completed an education course approved by the Traffic Safety Bureau that has a DWI prevention and education component; 2) the person has had an instruction permit for six months provided that 30 days shall be added to the six months for each traffic violation committed during the time the person was driving with an instruction permit; 3) the person has not been cited for a traffic violation that is pending at the time of application; and 4) has successfully completed a practice driving component. An applicant under 18 years of age who is making an application for a first New Mexico driver's license shall submit evidence that

the applicant has successfully completed a driver education course with a DWI prevention component approved by the Traffic Safety Bureau and has had a provisional license for at least a 12-month period immediately preceding the date of the application, provided that 30 days shall be added to the 12-month period for each adjudication or conviction of a traffic violation committed during the time the person was driving with a provisional license. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 147
SB 302

MV: DISABLED VETERANS PLATES (Martinez). Amends §66-3-412 to lower the degree of disability of veterans from 100 percent to 50 percent in order to have special registration plates issued; veteran is a person who participated in the United States armed forces and was not dishonorably discharged. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 148
SB 326

TRD SECRETARY APPROVAL OF CERTAIN EVIDENCE (Ingle). Amends §7-9-43; the Secretary of the Department of Taxation and Revenue or his delegate may accept other evidence as specified by rule, to support a gross receipts tax deduction for sale of tangible personal property or licenses if the tax payer is unable to provide a non-taxable transaction certificate within the 60-day period prior to the issuance of an audit assessment or if the audit assessment is protested, prior to either the taxpayer's withdrawal of the protest or the formal hearing of the protest; provided that the protest is acknowledged by the Department prior to December 31, 2011. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 151
SB 11

DOGS IN CERTAIN OUTDOOR RESTAURANT AREAS (Wirth). New material authorizes food service establishments to allow dogs in areas of outdoor eating areas with the following conditions: 1) no pet dog shall be allowed in any area where food is prepared; 2) patrons shall keep their pet dogs on a leash at all times and keep their pet dogs under reasonable control; 3) employees shall wash their hands immediately after touching, petting or otherwise handling pet dogs; 4) pet dogs shall not be allowed on chairs, tables or other furnishings; 5) accidents involving pet waste shall be cleaned immediately and the area sanitized; and 6) a sign or signs shall be posted to place the public on notice that the designated outdoor dining area is available for the use of patrons with pet dogs. A food service establishment may in its discretion prohibit pet dogs in outdoor dining areas. If a food service establishment allows pet dogs in a designated outdoor dining area, the food service establishment shall have the right to refuse to serve the owner of a pet dog if the owner fails to exercise reasonable control over the pet dog or the pet dog is otherwise behaving in a manner that compromises or threatens to compromise the health or safety of any person present in the restaurant. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 153
SB 45

ACTION AGAINST CITIES STATUTE OF LIMITATION (Griego, P.) Amends §37-1-24 to increase the statute of limitation from one to two years for lawsuits to recover damages for personal injury or death resulting from the negligence of any city, town or village or any officer thereof. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 162
SB 505

EXPAND FIRE PROTECTION FUND USES (Ingle). Amends §59A-53-8 to authorize proceeds of the Fire Protection Fund to be used for fire department emergency medical services, except for salaries. Effective 7/1/11.

Chapter 164

CS/SB 626

FIRE FUND DISTRIBUTION INCREASE DELAY. Amends §59A-53-5.2 to delay the increase in the distributions from the Fire Protection Fund to the Fire Protection Grant Fund by one year beginning in 2012. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 169

HB 167

FIRE PREVENTION ORDINANCES & CODE CHANGES (Doyle). Amends §60-13-6. Prohibits the Construction Industries Commission from enacting a bylaw, order, building code, policy or rule requiring the installation of residential fire protection sprinkler systems in detached one- and two-family dwellings and multiple single family dwellings, such as townhouses that are not more than three stories above grade plane in height and that have a separate means of egress and their accessory structures. Municipalities retain the ability to regulate residential sprinklers. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 172

HB 234

ANIMAL SHELTERING BOARD SUNSET DATE EXTENSION (Wallace). Amends §77-1B-12. Extends the sunset for the Animal Sheltering Board from July 1, 2011 to July 1, 2013. The Board shall continue to operate until the Animal Sheltering Act is repealed on July 1, 2014. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 174

HB 428

RAISE ORGANIZATION INCOME SUBJECT TO AUDIT (Brown). Amends §6-5A-1. For non-profit organizations that transfer money to state, municipal, county agencies or schools, raises the threshold of gross annual income at which the organizations are required to have audits from \$100,000 to \$250,000. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 175

HB 429

COMPENSATING TAX TRANSACTION REQUIREMENTS (Lujan, B.). Amends §7-9-7. Clarifies transaction requirements for certain compensating tax purposes by adding that the compensating tax on use of tangible property is on property acquired inside or outside of the state. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 180

CS/CS/

***HB 93**

POLICE TRAINING FOR MENTAL IMPAIRMENTS. Enacts one new section of the Law Enforcement Training Act; amends §29-7C-7. Requires a minimum of 40 hours of crisis management, including crisis intervention, confrontation de-escalation practicum and proper interaction with persons with mental impairments training to be included in curriculum of each basic law enforcement training class; a pre-recorded course shall not satisfy this requirement. Also requires a minimum of two hours of this training to be included with in-service training requirements; one hour of the training is also required to be a part of the dispatcher advanced training requirements. "Mental impairment" includes a mental illness, developmental disability, posttraumatic stress disorder, dual diagnosis, autism, youth in crisis and traumatic brain injury. Enacts a temporary provision to require the chief law enforcement officer of a state, county or municipal law enforcement agency, who was elected or appointed prior to July 1, 2011, to complete a minimum of two hours of this training no later than July 1, 2012. A law enforcement officer who on September 1, 2010 held an intermediate or advanced proficiency certificate pursuant to in-service training is required to complete a minimum of two hours of the training no later than July 1, 2012. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. Effective 4/8/11.

Chapter 181

CS/SB 52

ELECTRONIC COPIES OF PUBLIC RECORDS. Amends §14-2-9. Exempt information in an electronic document shall be removed along with the corresponding metadata prior to disclosure by utilizing methods or redaction tools that prevent the recovery of exempt information from a redacted electronic document; a custodian shall provide a public record in electronic format if the public record is available in electronic format and an electronic copy is specifically requested; a custodian is only required to provide the electronic record in the file format in which it exists at the time of the request; a custodian may charge the actual costs associated with downloading copies of the public records to a computer disk or storage device, including the actual cost of the computer disk or storage device and may charge actual costs associated with transmitting the record by mail, electronic mail or facsimile. Nothing shall limit the ability of the custodian to engage in the sale of data as authorized by the Public Records Act. Effective 6/17/11.

Chapter 182

CS/HB 160

PUBLIC RECORDS AVAILABILITY AND PROCEDURES. Amends §§14-2-6, -7, and -9 of the Inspection of Public Records Act. Enacts a new definition of “file format” meaning the internal structure of an electronic file that defines the way it is stored and used; authorizes records custodians to receive public records requests via electronic mail or fax; the custodian shall respond to requests in the same medium, electronic or paper, in which the request was made in addition to any other medium that the custodian deems appropriate; the notice regarding procedures for public records requests must be posted on the publicly accessible web site, if any, in addition to the required posting at the administrative offices; the notice of procedures for requesting public records must include the contact information for the custodian of public records. Requires exempt information in an electronic document to be removed, along with the corresponding metadata, prior to disclosure by utilizing methods or redaction tools that prevent the recovery of exempt information from a redacted electronic document. Requires a custodian to provide a copy of a public record in electronic format if the public record is available in electronic format and an electronic copy is specifically requested; however, a custodian is only required to provide the electronic record in the file format in which it exists at the time of the request. Clarifies that the current limit on charges of \$1.00 per page refers to “printed” page; authorizes the custodian to charge actual costs associated with downloading copies of public records to a computer disk or storage device, including the actual cost of the computer disk or storage device; also authorizes the charging of actual costs associated with transmitting copies of public records by mail, electronic mail or fax. Provides that nothing in this section regarding the provision of public data in electronic format shall limit the ability of the custodian to engage in the sale of data as authorized by Section 14-3-15.1, including imposing reasonable restrictions on the use of the database and the payment of a royalty or other consideration. Effective 6/17/11.

CAPITAL OUTLAY REAUTHORIZATION. See attached chart - Appendix A. **EMERGENCY CLAUSE.** Effective 4/8/11.

CS/HB 59

UNEMPLOYMENT CONTRIBUTION TEMPORARY SCHEDULE. Provides that extended benefits shall be paid only if fully reimbursed from federal sources; for weeks

beginning in a high unemployment period, allows benefits to be paid even if the state will not be fully reimbursed by the federal government; reduces the number of children for which \$25.00 each is paid from four to two; students in full-time courses in educational or training institution or program, except for approved vocational training programs, shall not be eligible for benefits unless the person can demonstrate they are able, available and actively seeking full- or part-time work. Amendments in specified sections shall apply to benefit years beginning on or after July 1, 2011. Effective 7/1/11.

RESOLUTIONS AND MEMORIALS

Constitutional Amendment 1

HJR 18 CA: MEMBERS ON JUDICIAL STANDARDS COMMISSION (Martinez, K). Proposes to amend Article 6, Section 32 of the NM Constitution to add a municipal judge and one more public member to the Judicial Standards Commission.

HJM 4 REDUCE BURDEN ON COUNTY DETENTION FACILITIES (King). Requests the Administrative Office of the Courts to convene a task force and conduct a study to identify ways to increase efficiency and reduce the burden on county detention facilities of housing arrestees held on felony charges or for violations of parole and probation; the task force shall include representatives from the New Mexico Association of Counties, county detention center administrators, the District Attorney's Association, the Administrative Office of the District Attorneys, the Public Defender Department, the Criminal Defense Lawyers Association, the New Mexico Sentencing Commission, and the New Mexico Sheriffs' and Police Association.

HJM 10 LARGE ANIMAL TRAFFIC SAFETY PILOT PROJECT (Stewart). Requests the Department of Transportation, Department of Game and Fish and the New Mexico State Police to work together, using existing resources such as signs and lights, to create a pilot traffic safety project in an accident-prone area of the state to increase the safety of New Mexico's residents by reducing large animal-vehicle collisions; participating agencies should consider reducing the speed limit and doubling the fines for speeding in the wildlife crossing zone. Recommendations should be made to the appropriate interim committee by June 30, 2012.

HJM 17 RESOURCES FOR PEOPLE WITH MENTAL DISORDERS (Miera). Cites that law enforcement agencies are the first-line responders to people with mental health disorders who are not receiving necessary treatment and that many are held in detention facilities for protective custody due to a lack of available treatment or community support. Requests the Interagency Behavioral Health Purchasing Collaborative, through the Behavioral Health Planning Council, to convene stakeholders to develop humane and effective strategies to serve people with mental health disorders in order to reduce the number of people with mental health disorders that require law enforcement intervention, and to reduce the number of people with mental health disorders in detention centers. Stakeholders shall include representatives from the New Mexico Association of Counties; the New Mexico Municipal League; Department of Health; Human Services Department; Training and Recruiting Division of the Department of Public Safety; Aging and Long Term Services Department; Corrections Department; Administrative Office of District Attorneys; Administrative Office of the Courts; Public Defender's Office; Sheriffs and

Police Association; New Mexico Behavioral Health Institute at Las Vegas; New Mexico Hospital Association; Disability Rights New Mexico; National Alliance on Mental Illness; and, two individuals living with serious mental illness identified by the Interagency Behavioral Health Purchasing Collaborative.

HJM 33 STUDY TOURISM DEPARTMENT PROMOTIONAL BUDGET (Doyle). States that tourism is a \$6 billion industry in New Mexico, that tourism is important to the state and should have a promotional budget commensurate with that of surrounding states; requests the appropriate legislative interim committee to study the potential for a dedicated stream of revenue to fund the promotional budget of the Tourism Department.

HJM 46 NEW MEXICO AS DISASTER AREA (Gonzales). Requests the New Mexico Congressional delegation to urge President Obama to immediately declare New Mexico a disaster area due to extreme cold weather and the loss of natural gas to numerous counties, cities and municipalities; cites the declaration is critical to restoring the public losses to state and local governments that are associated with uninsured damages.

HJM 51 TAX IMPACT OF RAILROAD TRACK PURCHASE (Vigil). Cites that if the state of New Mexico completes the purchase from Burlington Northern Railroad of railroad tracks that run parallel to I-25, each of the affected political subdivisions will lose property tax revenue and the overall tax burden will shift proportionately to other taxpayers. Requests the Taxation and Revenue and Transportation Departments to study the impact of the purchase on affected political subdivisions and to recommend an alternative revenue stream to replace the loss of tax revenue currently generated by the Railroad for that section of railroad tracks. A report is due to the appropriate interim legislative committee by October, 2011.

CS/HM 3 JURISDICTION CONSENT FOR MONUMENT DESIGNATION. States that sustainable land management and conservation policies are best developed and administered with local government and community support and commitment to those policies. Requests that, prior to any designation of national monuments in New Mexico, there be formal consultation and coordination among the President of the United States, Governor of New Mexico, New Mexico Congressional delegation, New Mexico legislature, local officials and interested conservation, industry, Indian nations, tribes and pueblos and user groups ensuring transparency and open public participation.

HM 9 CLEAN ARROYOS TASK FORCE (Powdrell-Culbert). Requests the Mid-Region Council of Governments to convene a task force to study ways to prevent the buildup of trash in arroyos; the task force shall include representatives from city, county and municipal flood control boards, the Department of Environment, the Environmental Improvement Board, and others with experience and knowledge regarding arroyos and city planning. Copies of this memorial shall be transmitted to the Mid-Region COG, Secretary of Environment, Chair of the Environmental Improvement Board, New Mexico Association of Counties and New Mexico Municipal League. Findings and recommendations are due to the appropriate interim committee by October, 2011.

HM 15 HONOR NEW MEXICO EMERGENCY SERVICES PERSONNEL (Gentry). Extends recognition and appreciation to police, sheriffs, law enforcement personnel, firefighters and firefighter paramedics statewide for their daily heroism and dedication to protecting New Mexicans from harm.

- HM 18 GALLUP: ADVENTURE CAPITAL OF NEW MEXICO (Lundstrom).** Declares Gallup as the Adventure Capital of New Mexico to honor and showcase Gallup's adventure tourism assets and the region's emerging status as an international hub for adventure tourism in New Mexico.
- HM 22 PRC INVESTIGATION ON NATURAL GAS SERVICE LOSS (Gonzales).** Requests the Public Regulation Commission to convene a task force to investigate how and why New Mexico consumers lost natural gas service in early February of 2011; the task force is to make recommendations on how to prevent such loss of service in the future and determine whether state or federal legislation is needed to carry out its recommendations. A report is due to the Governor and appropriate legislative interim committee by August 1, 2011.
- HM 23 2012 CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION PROJECTS (Tripp).** Encourages all state, tribal and local government agencies to participate in New Mexico's 2012 statehood centennial commemoration by creating and promoting projects designed to honor, commemorate and celebrate the history, traditions and future of the state while facilitating education, economic development, tourism and civic pride.
- HM 28 ALBUQUERQUE ROAD DEVELOPMENT PRIORITIES (Lewis).** Declares the Paseo del Norte Boulevard and Interstate 25 interchange project and construction of the missing portion of Paseo del Volcan Boulevard between Paseo del Norte and Southern Boulevard as priorities in the Albuquerque metropolitan planning area; urges the communities in the Albuquerque metropolitan planning area, the federal government and private parties whose lands will be improved by this project to join together to fund the project; and requests the Department of Transportation to report to the appropriate legislative interim committee by September 1, 2011 on funding alternatives for completion of this project.
- HM 30 ASSESS STATE'S PLANNING DISTRICTS (Lundstrom).** Requests the Local Government Division of DFA, the Department of Transportation, and the Governor's Office to convene a task force with the New Mexico Association of Regional Councils, including all seven of the state's planning districts, to prepare a report that will assess the planning districts, with a focus on utilization and accountability; the report is to be presented to the Legislative Finance Committee prior to December 1, 2011.
- HM 47 PEDESTRIAN OVERPASS IN SANTA FE STUDY (Lujan, B).** Requests the Transportation Department to study the safety solutions for students and staff at the Santa Fe Indian School and New Mexico School for the Deaf as well as other pedestrians and residents accessing St. Francis Drive and Cerrillos Road, to include the feasibility of constructing pedestrian overpasses. A report is due to the appropriate interim committee by November, 2011.
- HM 51 REQUEST CLEAN ENERGY INNOVATION ZONES (O'Neill).** States that New Mexico is poised to benefit from emerging clean energy economies due to its abundance of resources and renewable energy assets and that the creation of clean energy zones would spur new economic activity and job growth in both rural and urban areas; requests the Office of the State Engineer, Economic Development Department and Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department to collaborate with interested business and community leaders to develop the parameters of a process to establish clean energy

innovation zones; a joint report of their findings is due to the appropriate interim legislative committee by September 1, 2011.

- CS/HM 53 DOH IMPACT STUDY OF MEDICAL MARIJUANA ACTS.** Requests the Department of Health to conduct a study of the impact on the state of the Medical Marijuana Acts and that the study consider new developments in the field of medicine, appropriate age ranges for treatment of conditions with medical marijuana, legal status of unresolved conflicts between state and federal law, and whether use of marijuana for medical purposes has resulted in any increased criminal activity and other issues. Requests that the study also consider testimony by medical marijuana patients and health care providers with experience using the treatments as to the results; requests that the study identify current and future projected state income generated by a sales tax on medical cannabis and by fees collected by the medical cannabis program, and the jobs generated from the program; also requests that the study identify unresolved issues, problems and benefits and whether continuation of the program is justified. In conducting the study, the Department of Health is asked to consult with and survey registered medical cannabis patients, including combat veterans suffering from PTSD, the Office of the Attorney General, health care providers experienced in treating patients with medical cannabis, families of patients, and the Medical Cannabis Program's medical advisory board. A report of the findings and recommendations is due to the appropriate interim legislative committee by October 2011.
- HM 54 LIQUOR CONTROL ACT REVIEW (Cook).** Requests the appropriate interim legislative committee to review the Liquor Control Act and the impact on economic development of the underlying policy of that Act that limits the number of full-service liquor licenses in each municipality and in the unincorporated portions of each county; the committee is requested to determine the feasibility of revising the Liquor Control Act to provide for additional full-service liquor licenses, especially in smaller market local option districts, in order to enhance opportunities for economic development.
- HM 63 RAIL RUNNER EXPANSION TO GALLUP (Lundstrom).** Requests the Transportation Department to conduct a feasibility study to determine possible routes, optimum frequency of trips and potential costs of extending the Rail Runner Express from Albuquerque to Gallup.
- HM 68 GALLUP: STUDY HIGHWAY 118 IMPROVEMENTS (Lundstrom).** Requests the Transportation Department to conduct a feasibility study to identify and evaluate possible improvements to the State Highway 118 corridor through downtown Gallup, including redesigning the downtown section with traffic calming measures, signalized crosswalks, angled parking, signage and other measures that would increase safety for pedestrians, bicyclists and motorists; requests the study be done with involvement of the Northwest Regional Planning Organization, City of Gallup engineering department, Gallup business improvement district, Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad and other local and regional stakeholders and businesses; specifies what the study should include and stresses that the study is not to begin until sufficient funds have been allocated from local public and private sources so that the Transportation Department's financial contribution will be negligible.
- SJR 1 LAS CRUCES LAND AND BUILDING DONATION (Papen).** Authorizes the Property Control Division of the General Services Department to donate real property to

the City of Las Cruces in Doña Ana County; the authorization is contingent upon agreement by the parties in the conveyance document that, if the City of Las Cruces ever decides that the property is no longer needed for any municipal purpose and should be disposed of, at the option of the state and at no cost to the state, the property shall be re-conveyed by the City to the state.

- SJM 6 GANG REDUCTION AND PREVENTION PROGRAM (Campos).** Requests the Department of Public Safety to create a Gang Reduction, Intervention and Prevention Program to consolidate and centralize statewide efforts and resources for prevention, intervention and suppression of gang activity; the program should reflect current best practices and findings of the National Gang Intelligence Center and other federal efforts to address gang activity.
- SM 2 STUDY HOME INSPECTOR LICENSING (Eichenberg).** Requests representatives of the Regulation and Licensing Department, the New Mexico Real Estate Commission and REALTORS® Association form a working group to study legislation providing for home inspector licensing; findings and proposed legislation from the group are to be presented to the interim Mortgage Finance Authority Oversight Committee by November 15, 2011.
- SM 6 CAPITAL OUTLAY PROJECT MONITORING PROCESS (Campos).** Requests the Legislative Finance Committee, the Department of Finance and Administration, the New Mexico Municipal League, the New Mexico Association of Counties, the All Indian Pueblo Council, the Navajo Nation and the Legislative Council Service to collaborate on a process to prioritize, review and monitor capital outlay projects; requests the group establish a capital outlay planning and review committee and that the committee report to the appropriate interim committee by January 1, 2012.
- SM 18 DRUG POLICY TASK FORCE CONTINUATION (Sanchez, B.)** Requests that UNM's Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Center for Health Policy continue the work of the Drug Policy Task Force in order to complete its comprehensive statewide strategic plan based on the Four Pillars approach; the task force should continue to evaluate New Mexico's approach to alleviating the negative consequences associated with the use of alcohol and other drugs; the task force is to present its final comprehensive statewide strategic plan, including conclusions and recommendations, to the interim Legislative Health and Human Services Committee, the Legislative Finance Committee, the Courts, Corrections and Justice Committee and other appropriate committees by November, 2011.
- SM 30 PRC INVESTIGATION ON NATURAL GAS SERVICE LOSS (Cisneros).** Same as HM 22.
- SM 31 2012 CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION PROJECTS (Ortiz y Pino).** Same as HM 23.
- SM 48 STUDY BUILDUP OF TRASH IN ARROYOS (Rue).** Same as HM 9.
- SM 67 PEDESTRIAN OVERPASS IN SANTA FE STUDY (Griego, P.)** Same as HM 47.
- SM 83 LAS CRUCES FIREFIGHTERS & "VECINO" PROGRAM (Garcia).** Honors the Las Cruces fire department and firefighters for their participation in the Vecino Program,

which involves firefighters and crew making daily telephone calls to check on the health and well-being of individuals who are homebound with no relatives in the area.
